



EVANS SCHOOL INTERNSHIP AWARDS 2011

Application deadline: Friday, April 29, 2011 by 4pm.

Prerequisites for All Awards:

All awards have the following requirements. Each specific award may have additional requirements.

- Applicants must be currently enrolled Evans School students graduating in December 2011 or later.
- Students must not have yet fulfilled their Evans School internship requirement. Preference is given to those without significant previous work experience.
- Students may develop their own internship opportunity or apply for a currently advertised unpaid internship that fits the award criteria.
- Students can apply for any awards for which they meet the stated requirements; but no student will receive more than one award.
- All awards are available in June and are intended to support full-time summer internships of a minimum of 400 hours.
- All students who receive an award will be required to attend the Annual Evans School Fellowship event, sometime during winter or spring quarter.

AWARDS LIST AND DESCRIPTIONS

ELAINE CHANG ENDOWED FELLOWSHIP FOR INTERNATIONAL PEACE & DEVELOPMENT

The Elaine Chang Endowed Fellowship for International Peace & Development provides for availability of funding for an international internship. The award will provide support for a student pursuing an unpaid or low-paid internship in an organization focused on peace and development issues (preference given to non-U.S. internships). The award will be made available in June and is intended to support full-time summer internships for 400-480 hours. (Students may begin interning part-time before funds become available.) One award of \$1,600 is available.

Specific Requirements for Elaine Chang Award:

- Selection will be based on academic merit and the merits of the student's proposal as it relates to international peace and development.
- Preference will be given to students who wish to perform activities outside of the United States.
- Preference will be given to internship proposals in which the sponsoring agency can provide some level of matching stipend or the student has secured resources from another source (i.e. grant).

HUBERT LOCKE FELLOWSHIPS IN SOCIAL JUSTICE (DOMESTIC)

In honor of Professor Hubert Locke's years of service to the School of Public Affairs and the field of social justice, we are proud to invite applications for the Locke Fellowship in Social Justice. This fellowship was funded by persons interested in honoring Professor Hubert Locke and his concerns for justice in our society. The award will provide support for a student pursuing an internship in a non-profit organization devoted to domestic social justice issues. The award will be available in June and is intended to support a full-time summer internship, 400-480 hours. (The recipient may begin interning part-time before funds become available if necessary.) Three awards of \$2,500 will be available.

Specific Requirements for Locke Fellowships:

Selection will be based on academic merit and the merits of the student's proposal as it relates to social justice.

- The fund is intended for internship work in an organization that focuses on dealing with problems, issues, and needs confronting the poor and the dispossessed in our society. Students and organizations working in urban inner city or economically depressed rural communities are of special interest.
- Preference will be given to internship proposals in which *the sponsoring agency can provide some level of matching support or the student has secured resources from another source (i.e. grant)*. However, this is not a requirement.

NANCY BELL EVANS CENTER ON NONPROFITS & PHILANTHROPY NONPROFIT FELLOWSHIP

The Nancy Bell Evans Center on Nonprofits & Philanthropy is offering fellowships in support of nonprofit service. The awards will provide support for students pursuing unpaid or low-paid internships at nonprofit or philanthropic organizations. The awards will be made available in June and are intended to support full-time summer internships for a minimum of 400 hours. Students may begin interning part-time before funds become available. The number of fellowships offered will depend upon the quantity and quality of applications, as well as demonstrated financial need. Applications for two awards up to \$2,500 will be considered.

Specific Requirements for Nancy Bell Evans Center Nonprofit Fellowship:

Selection will be based on academic merit and the merits of the student's proposal.

- The funding is intended for internship work in nonprofit or philanthropic organizations that are focused on the arts, community development, education, the environment, health, sector research, social justice, or social services.
- Preference will be given to internship proposals in which *the sponsoring agency can provide some level of matching stipend or the student has secured resources from another source (i.e. grant)*.
- Fellowship recipients will be required to present a summary of their internship experience at the Spring 2011 Washington State Nonprofit Conference.

JENNIFER DUNN-THOMSON FELLOWSHIP is a grant of \$5,000 to be given to one Evans School student who exemplifies the leadership, commitment to public service, and personal and emotional commitment to helping people illustrated by Jennifer Dunn-Thomson. Preference given to a student conducting an internship working with elected officials affiliated with the Republican Party. Selection will be based on academic merit and the merits of the student's proposal.

- Students who apply for this award should mention in their application essay how they believe they reflect the qualities exemplified by Jennifer Dunn-Thomson.

THE CLASS GIFT FELLOWSHIP supports students pursuing internships at environmental, community development, international, or social and educational development nonprofits or public-sector agencies. The fellowships are funded through gifts from Evans School alumni. (In 2011, one award of \$2,500 will be provided to support a student pursuing an unpaid or low-paid internship in a nonprofit organization or public sector agency.)

Selection will be based on academic merit and the merits of the student's proposal.

- The fund is intended for internship work in nonprofit or public sector, environmental, community development, international, or social and educational development organizations/agencies.
- Preference will be given to internship proposals in which *the sponsoring agency can provide some level of matching stipend or the student has secured resources from another source (i.e. grant)*.

Required Documents:

Students must submit an application to the Evans School Special Fellowships Committee. A written promise of internship employment must be provided at time of application, even if internship is not to begin until summer. The application should include the following materials:

1. A narrative description (three page limit) of the internship the student plans to undertake, including:
 - The tasks the student will complete during the internship (you may attach an internship description).
 - The goals of the internship for the student and the organization.
 - How this internship fits your goals and academic interest.
 - Specific narrative for each of the specific awards. For each award you are applying for, write a short statement explaining how your internship fits with each award, as follows:
 - Elaine Chang Endowed Fellowship For International Peace & Development:** Explain how the skills and experiences obtained relate to peace and development outside of the U.S.
 - Locke Fellowships In Social Justice:** How these tasks and goals of the internship will contribute to social justice in our society.
 - Nancy Bell Evans Center On Nonprofits & Philanthropy Nonprofit Fellowship:** Explain how the skills and experiences obtained will lead to Excellence in Nonprofit Service.
 - Jennifer Dunn-Thomson Fellowship:** Explain how you exemplify the leadership, commitment to public service, and personal and emotional commitment to helping people illustrated by Jennifer Dunn-Thomson. Explain how your internship demonstrates this commitment to public service.
 - The proposed dates of the internship.
 - A description of the contribution the organization will make toward the student's internship. This may include in-kind contributions, salary, stipends, subsidies for transportation, or other support given to the student. Please also mention any outside sources of funding that you have been awarded to help offset your summer costs (i.e. grants/scholarships).
2. Descriptive materials about the agency/organization and written promise of employment.
3. Current resume.
4. Current Evans School transcript (unofficial okay).

By submitting this application, I state that all the application material is correct and accurate. If awarded the fellowship, I agree to attend the Annual Evans School Fellowship luncheon, write a thank you letter for the award, and fulfill the requirements of the internship.
